While our building in downtown Nevada has served the community well over the years, the time has come for it to be replaced. This new construction only strengthens our commitment to this community and to one of our most precious resources—our older adults. We are excited to share this transformative project with you and welcome you to follow along as we plan to break ground next Spring.

Taking Senior Senior Care to Another Another Level Story Medical Shares Plans for New Facility

Story Medical has long been viewed as a leader in the provision of Senior Care in Nevada and beyond. That commitment to serving older adults with comprehensive residential care is set to grow significantly with the construction of a new facility adjacent to the Medical Center on its South Campus.

"We have a rich legacy of offering high quality, compassionate long-term care," says Story Medical CEO Nate Thompson. "Our North Campus Senior Care facility has served this community well over the years, but the time has come to replace it. Our new facility will provide convenient care coordination for residents, provide individual rooms, and provide a space that looks like, and feels more like home."

The new Senior Care facility will enhance overall efficiency at Story Medical by combining Nevada operations onto one campus, while allowing for shared services to be easily leveraged to support Senior Care, hospital and clinics. While important, those benefits are secondary to what the new facility will provide residents.

"We want this to be home for our residents," says Ashley Wilson, Director of Nursing at Senior Care. "What better way to offer residents a home-like feel than by offering individual rooms where they can decorate with the memories that bring them joy, and have the convenience and privacy of simple touches like having their own bathroom within their personal space? That is priceless."

The state-of-the-art "household" model has been shown to improve the resident experience along with staff efficiency.

STORY COUNTY MEDICAL CENTER

The new 59,000 square foot facility will be located immediately adjacent to the Medical Center. It is designed to provide 60 spacious private units, inviting porch entries, family gathering spaces, gardens for each house, a conference room, a therapy room and more.

The design of the facility itself allows for the implementation of best practice workflows and facilitates more direct interaction between staff and residents. In all respects, the new Senior Care facility will help residents to live their life to the fullest in a place they can call home.

"For the longest time, nursing homes have been viewed as a place where you go to just lay in bed until it is your time to go," Wilson says. "That stereotype could not be further from the truth. In our new facility, we are confident we will be able to change that perception. People will begin to see that our Senior Care is a place to live and continue to thrive."

Story County Medical Center has provided Senior Care services since 1969. The service delivers 24hour care while offering a lifestyle that focuses on promoting independence, comfort and security.

As the population in Story County continues to age, and the demand for 24-hour elder care delivered in a facility with private rooms increases, the timing is right for this project.

"Currently, we aren't able to provide all our residents private rooms," Wilson says. "To be completely honest, moving into a long term care facility is not easy. When that is compounded by having to share a space with someone you don't know, it becomes even more difficult. Providing a space that looks and feels more like home than a sterile healthcare facility will change how the resident's world looks in their new home."

Groundbreaking for the new project is tentatively scheduled for Spring 2023, with opening targeted for late 2024. The project is being funded through a low interest direct loan as part of the USDA's Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Program. The program provides affordable funding to develop essential community facilities in rural areas.

"The time is right for us to upgrade the Senior Care options in this community," Thompson says. "This is just an expansion of our more than 50 year commitment to providing comprehensive care to older adults in Story County. We are excited to break ground and make this significant addition to our campus."

Trouble Getting Your ZZZs? It May be Time for a Sleep Study

As many as 70 million Americans suffer from sleep disorders including Obstructive Sleep Apnea (OSA). The Sleep Medicine team at Story Medical is nationally certified and ready to help you get a good night's sleep.

The first step in treating OSA is being diagnosed. Your primary care provider can assess your condition using tools like the S.T.O.P B.A.N.G and Epworth Sleepiness Scale questionnaires below. If an examination and the screening tools indicate you may have OSA, your provider will refer you for a sleep study.

We offer sleep studies both in our homelike room at the Medical Center and home tests. If you are diagnosed with OSA or another sleep disorder, there are a number of effective tools to help you improve your sleep and your quality of life.

These two quizzes can help you gain insight on whether you may have a sleep disorder. It is a good idea to share your results with your primary care provider.

Epworth Sleepiness Scale

How likely are you to doze off or fall asleep in the following situations. Score in this manner: O=Never, 1=Slight Chance, 2=Moderate Chance, 3=High Chance

Score Activity

- Sitting and reading
- Watching TV

Sitting inactive in a public place (theater/meeting, etc.)

Riding as a passenger for a continuous hour

Lying down to rest in the afternoon

- Sitting and talking to someone
- Sitting quietly after a lunch without alcohol

Sitting at a traffic stop light for a few minutes

SCORE (Add Answers):

0-10=Normal, 11-12=Borderline, 12-24=Sleepy

S.T.O.P B.A.N.G Screening

Check the box for each "Yes" answer.

- □ S (snore): Do you snore?
- □ T (tired): Do you feel fatigued during the day? Do you wake up feeling like you have not slept?
- □ O (obstruction): Have you been told you stop breathing at night? Do you gasp for air or choke`while sleeping?
- □ P (pressure)" Do you have high blood pressure or are on medication to control high blood pressure?

SCORE: If you checked YES to two or more questions on the STOP portion you are at risk for OSA.

- \square B (BMI): Is your body mass index greater than 28?
- \Box A (age): Are you 50 years old or older?
- □ N (neck): Are you a male with neck circumference greater than 17 inches, or a female with neck circumference greater than 16 inches?
- □ G (gender): Are you a male?

SCORE: The more questions you checked YES to on the BANG portion, the greater your risk of having moderate to severe $\ensuremath{\mathsf{OSA}}$



Need help installing car seats? Nevada Public Safety has you covered

Attention Nevada residents — especially those of you about to embark on the adventure of installing a child's car seat — the City of Nevada has a valuable service available to you.

The Nevada Public Safety Department (PSD) can help residents learn how to install car seats properly.

While all Nevada officers have some basic training in this area, the Department recently had a second officer become certified as a Child Passenger Safety Technician.

Officer Matt Celentano (pictured), who has been with the Nevada PSD for about three years, completed training at the Clive Police Department in May. He now joins Community Service Officer Nancy Pritchard as the Public Safety Department's certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians.

Celentano attended a four-day course, paid for by the Governor's Traffic Safety Bureau, and taught by Janna Day, Child Passenger Safety Coordinator with Blank Children's Hospital. Celentano and Pritchard are both certified with the National Child Passenger Safety Board.

The timing could not be more perfect for Celentano, who just became a father for the first time in late April when his daughter Chloe was born.

"Before taking the course, I had put her car seat in, and it took me about 30 minutes. After going through the course, I could put it in correctly in just a few minutes. I also noticed there were some things I hadn't done quite right when I first installed it," he said.

Celentano noted that one of the most common mistakes people make when installing their car seat is to "double up" on some of the safety features. "For example, on some of the bases of the car seats there is what's called a 'lock-off.' For many car seats, that feature is supposed to be used by itself, unless the car seat's manufacturer recommends differently."

The confusion, Celentano said, often comes because of the variables in car seats and in vehicles. "You have multiple manufacturers of car seats, and you have an endless variety of vehicles those car seats will go into. How they work together is important to understand." And to understand it, he said, you need to thoroughly read the car seat manual, and you might need to consult with someone who has gone through training, like himself or Pritchard.

Other questions can also come up regarding car seats. How long does my child need to be in one? What style is best for my child? When is it time to change to a booster seat? Is a booster seat necessary? Can I buy a used car seat? And so on.

If you want to talk to one of the Nevada Public Safety Department's Child Passenger Safety Technicians, please call the non-emergency police number, 515-382-4305, to make an appointment.

"Plan to spend a little time at the appointment," Celentano advises. "It may take me only 2 minutes to install a car seat, but ultimately, I'm going to show you how to do it, and I want you to be able to install it on your own before you leave."

Nevada officers will also provide people with a child passenger safety checklist and a list of recalled car seats.

Nevada teen earns Eagle Scout Badge while improving local fishing amenities

Nevada Parks and Recreation and the Nevada community are once again the benefactors of local boys pursuing their Eagle Scout badge.

This summer, Ryan Wessels added to the amenities of Wilson Pond, one of Nevada's in-city fishing ponds located on the west side of town. Frideres at scout meetings. On June 21, despite a "feels like" temperature of 99 degrees, Ryan, and several others helping him, were busy getting helical piers screws transported and drilled into the pond.

They started on Cherokee near one of the trailheads getting everything ready for transport along the trail. Helping with the process were Matt Runge, owner of OnTrack Construction; Matt Frideres, a contractor; and Mark Frideres, a local Boy Scouts leader. Runge was supplying the mini excavator needed to drill the helical screws into the water.

"One thing Scouting has taught me is about leadership and being able to contact people like Matt Runge and Matt Frideres," Ryan said. "I had to talk to them about my ideas and then work with them to make the idea come to life. That's really kind of cool to think about."

Ryan, 15, and soon to be a sophomore at Nevada High

School, is the son of Jennifer and Jason Wessels. He's been a member of Boy Scouts Troop 128.

Ryan said this project — adding a 10 x 12 ADA-accessible dock/deck fishing platform at Wilson Pond — was born out of his love of fishing.

In trying to determine what his Eagle Scout project would be, Ryan said he spent a lot of time talking to leader Mark da became the focal point. Wilson Pond is where another Troop 128 member, Nick Fride-

res, completed his Eagle Scout project, building a new shelter house next to the pond last summer. The original shelter had been damaged in the 2020 derecho.

Ryan said the fishing platform he's creating will sit fairly close to the shelter. "It's right off the trail," he said.

Completion of Ryan's project happened on Saturday, June 25, when Ryan and a group of fellow scouts, leaders, and parents built the platform on top of the helical pier screws. "The deck will be made of composite decking material and mostly wood," he noted.

The fishing platform project is not the only time Ryan has put in work at Wilson Pond. He said one of his first endeavors there to improve fishing was working last winter with Iowa DNR officials to make brush piles, which they sank to improve fish habitat.

Ryan hopes his Eagle Scout project will be a positive addition to the Nevada community. "Hopefully it will allow more people to fish, and it will be easier for people who need ADA accessibility and families."

Ryan is only entering his second year of high school, but we asked if this project has given him any ideas of what he wants to do in the future. "I predict I might want to do something in the engineering field," he said.

CONTINUING TO BUILD OUR 'GET AWAY FOR A DAY'

Get away for a day. This was the theme of our presentation to Main Street Iowa three years ago. Iowa Economic Development Authority announced the newest Main Street Iowa communities in August of 2019. For Nevada the wait had been lengthy.

We first attempted to become a Main Street community in 1986. In the attempts that followed, the effort never made it to the final application phase. However, the committee applying in 2019 was determined to be the next Main Street Iowa community. They presented with five other communities who were vying for the two available spots. The presentation featured a live DJ and an official meeting of the Nevada City Council, live streamed back to Nevada. The invitation to join Main Street Iowa was an exciting opportunity for the community.

Along with Nevada, Coon Rapids was brought into Main Street Iowa that year. Traditionally new Main Street programs use their first couple of years to begin their work and to develop plans. However, March of 2020 brought a new challenge to Main Street Nevada (MSN). The Central Business District Street (CBD) project and a global pandemic crossed paths. Small businesses took this time to be creative and promote their local options.

During the last three years, work hasn't stopped for MSN. Five grants have led to the investment of almost \$1.5 million in building projects in the downtown area. Eight new businesses have opened in the Main Street District and 14 major events have been held. This is just the beginning of the Main Street Nevada effort. Each committee is tasked with goals to fulfill our vision of what Main Street in Nevada should be.

We dream of filling currently vacant spaces. From pizza places to unique retail shops, we have room for more! Aside from shopping and entertainment, some folks come downtown for the business of life. Though the niche for Main Street Nevada is the combination of its history, entertainment, and retail, it's also the heart of the town.

We dream of a future for the heart of Nevada to once again be the destination and event place for gatherings of friends and guests to our community. We truly believe Nevada is a "get away for a day" in the making.





Story County is proud to be a Home Base Iowa Community! Home Base Iowa is a statewide program connecting Veterans and transitioning servicemembers with career opportunities in Iowa. As part of the Home Base Iowa initiative, Story County established the "Welcome Home to Story County Relocation Assistance Program," which allows up to \$2,500 in relocation assistance for Veterans moving into Story County. Each Veteran is eligible for a one-time maximum grant of \$2,500 to assist with relocation needs when they move here. These funds are paid on a reimbursable basis, and documentation of all eligible expenses must be submitted when applying for funds.

In order to be eligible to apply, the applicant must be relocating to Story County and establishing Story County as their primary residence; if purchasing a home, it must be located within Story County; they must have been discharged under honorable conditions; they must be employed full-time within Story County; and the Veteran must apply to the Welcome Home to Story County Relocation Assistance Program.

Funds must be used for moving expenses, utility deposits, rent for temporary housing while waiting on permanent housing, purchase of appliances, down-payment assistance or rent deposits and rental assistance. Funds used for down-payment assistance for the purchase of a house are distributed directly from Story County to the lender at the time of closing. In all cases of rental assistance, funds are payable directly to the leasing agent/landlord.

•Vietnam War*: August 5, 1964 - May 7, 1975

*If a Veteran was in Vietnam between 2-28-1961 and 8-04-1964, the Veteran is still considered wartime service.
