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



Operation Green Light for Veterans

Story County buildings will be illuminated green November 6-12 as part of Operation Green Light, a national collaborative initiative of the National Association of Counties (NACo) to support military Veterans, as well as raise awareness about the unique challenges faced by many Veterans and the resources that are available at the county, state, and federal level to assist Veterans and their families.



In addition to lighting county buildings, residents and businesses are encouraged to participate by simply changing one light bulb in their house to a green bulb. This can be an exterior light that neighbors and passersby see, or an interior light that sparks a conversation with friends. Coloring sheets with a light bulb are being distributed to schools, and posters are going to nursing homes and retirement communities. By shining a green light, we let our Veterans know they are seen, appreciated, and supported.

Home Base Iowa Updates

Story County recently made changes to our Welcome Home to Story County Relocation Assistance program through Home Base Iowa. Increasing from \$2,500, the program now allows up to \$3,000 in relocation assistance for eligible Veterans moving to Story County. Each Veteran is eligible for a one-time maximum grant of \$3,000 to assist with relocation. These funds are paid on a reimbursable basis, and documentation of all eligible expenses must be submitted when applying for funds.

Eligible Uses:

- Moving expenses
- Utility deposits
- Rent for temporary housing while waiting for permanent housing ^
- Purchase of appliances
- Down-payment assistance
- Rent deposits and rental assistance ^

* Funds used for down-payment assistance for the purchase of a house are distributed directly from Story County to the lender at time of closing.

^ Story County may provide rental assistance up to \$3,000 for eligible applicants. In all cases of rental assistance, funds are payable directly to the leasing agent/landlord.

Eligible applicants must meet all of the following criteria:

- Be relocating to Story County and establish Story County as the primary residence;
- If purchasing a home, real estate being purchased must be located within Story County;
- Be discharged under honorable conditions;
- Be employed in a full-time position within Story County; and
- Apply to the Welcome Home to Story County Relocation Assistance Program within 24 months of moving to Story County.

New public hunting opportunity

Please help Story County Conservation spread the word about a new public hunting opportunity in Story County that will provide access to youth and persons with disabilities.

Beginning this fall, a new, accessible blind for archery hunting is available for reservation at Story County Conservation's Sleepy Hollow property, located just north of Ames.

The new, ADA-accessible blind will be open for reservations throughout the hunting season, in specific windows from September 2023 to January 2024. Reservations for hunting are limited exclusively to persons with disabilities, as well as youth hunters 15 years old or under. All youth must be accompanied by an adult, age 21 or older, who possesses a valid hunting license.



This new hunting opportunity aligns with SCC's efforts to address barriers and enable underserved user groups to participate in activities—and enjoy the benefits of those activities—on an equal basis. Accommodations can be made for an SCC mentor to help with the hunt or harvest, when planned in advance. Mentorship will be available as SCC staff resources allow.

Four agribusinesses partner to support new fire engine

Key Cooperative, Lincolnway Energy, Mid-States Companies and Verbio — all located in Nevada, announced Oct. 9 they are partnering to financially support the Nevada Fire Department. The four agribusinesses will contribute the remaining \$50,000 needed to order the new rural fire engine for the Nevada Fire Department.

“The Nevada Fire Department depends on community support,” said Ray Reynolds, Director of Fire & Emergency Medical Services. “When that support comes from partners critical to our community, it is even more special. “

In March, the Nevada Fire Department began fundraising efforts to replace its 26-year-old rural fire engine. The City of Nevada committed to the purchase of a new engine, however, fire apparatus significantly increases in cost every six months. With the commitment from the four agribusinesses, the new engine is now currently locked in at \$668,000 and will take two years to build. The new apparatus will hold 1,500 gallons of water, which is a necessary supply for a city or rural fire attack.

“These businesses contribute to the economic success of Nevada. In an era where every charitable cause is in need of champions, we are thrilled our community’s new fire engine is made 100 percent whole with this donation,” said Reynolds.

'Tis the Season: Flu Shot Arrives at Story Medical

Vaccination can ease effects of influenza

Story Medical Clinics in Nevada and Maxwell are now offering the seasonal flu shot by appointment. You are encouraged – especially if you fall into a high-risk category – to get your shot as soon as possible.

“Flu season typically peaks between December and February, but significant activity can occur earlier than that,” says Dr. Arthur Check, Story Medical Clinic, Nevada. “We are especially encouraging those in high risk categories, including older adults, young children and those with chronic conditions to get vaccinated now.”

For millions of people every season, the flu can mean a fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle aches, fatigue, and miserable days spent in bed. However, you may not realize that each flu season, flu also causes hundreds of thousands of hospitalizations, and thousands or sometimes tens of thousands of deaths.

But there is a vaccine that can prevent flu. While how well the vaccine works can vary, the benefits from vaccination are well documented. Studies show that flu vaccination can reduce flu illnesses, doctors' visits, missed work and school

due to flu, as well as prevent flu-related hospitalizations.

This is why CDC recommends an annual flu vaccine for everyone 6 months and older. Those falling in high-risk categories include young children, pregnant women, people 65 and older and people with certain medical conditions, like asthma, diabetes or heart disease.

“Those who care for anyone at high risk, including babies younger than 6 months because they are too young to get the vaccine should also make it a priority to get the vaccine,” Dr. Check says. “Getting the flu vaccine is simple, and it’s the most important thing you can do to protect yourself and your family from the flu.”

In addition to the flu shot, Story Medical Clinics will offer the RSV vaccine to adults 60 years and older. Those with Medicare part D will need to get this vaccine from their pharmacy.

Volunteer Fire Departments are in a National Recruitment Crisis

WHO ARE YOU EXPECTING TO SHOW UP WHEN YOU CALL 911?

Imagine a world where you call 911 because your house is on fire or your spouse is having a heart attack and a volunteer fire department or first responder unit responds 45 minutes later. There are places in central Iowa where that is the norm. Most people experiencing an emergency say, "It took forever for help to arrive." But what if help never arrived?

Volunteer fire departments make up 86 percent of the fire departments in America. Every day, fire departments are closing their doors with no one to pick up the calls. This means substantial delays in responding to your call for service. For volunteer departments to be successful, well, it takes volunteers. While fires are only 4 percent of our call volume, fires are faster, grow more rapidly, and routinely become more dangerous the longer the response time. Medical emergencies are 82 percent of our calls. The rest you ask? We call them "smells and bells." Good intent false fire alarms, cancelled enroute, powerlines down, and a variety of other emergencies where help is needed.

The days of volunteering long term have gone by the way-side. However, we see people who volunteer for one year usually stay serving for quite some time. Yes, people routinely volunteer to help out at a one-day event or town concert. But to see someone dedicate years as a volunteer just isn't happening. We also see volunteers leave the fire

service to take better jobs outside our community.

Nevada responds to 800 calls each year and this year we are on track to reach a record level of calls. Our current response time average is between 4 and 5 minutes to reach scene. Being a volunteer means you can respond when you are available. It certainly doesn't mean you have to make every call. We offer free training to develop a skillset, and you are equipped with the best protective gear available on the market. We train every Wednesday evening, and you have the opportunity to volunteer with meaning. Nevada has a limit of 50 members, and we currently have 44. You can be a medical person with EMT or paramedic skills, or you can be a firefighter. You can also be involved in support operations if going into burning buildings is not your cup of tea. Nevada has a solid fire department, but in order to keep our response times low and our department fully staffed, we need you.

The point is, volunteering starts with YOU! Being a volunteer member of the fire department is very rewarding. Spend a month of Wednesdays with us and see if we are the right fit for you.

If you want to know the time commitment to serve on your community's fire department, simply stop at the fire depart-

ment on a Wednesday evening around 7 p.m. or email the Fire Chief: rreynolds@cityofnevada-iowa.org.

Facts:

1) Average response time from time of page until a unit is enroute is under one minute.

2) The department has had as low as 19 members and as many as 50 members.

3) The department currently has 44 members.

4) The department averages 20 people responding to structure fires.

5) Members are required to have 24 hours of training to meet state law.



6) A small stipend of \$7.50 per call is paid to volunteers.

7) There are three employers in town who allow employee firefighters to respond during work hours.

8) The department experiences 533 medical calls, 245 fire responses, with 35 being actual structure fires.

9) The department has nine volunteer

paramedic providers.

10) Membership starts at 16 years of age for support operations and 18 to be a firefighter or medic.

Be safe if frying a turkey

As the holidays are coming here are a few safety tips to know when frying a turkey.

- Always read the directions on the fryer you buy.
- Never use a propane-fueled fryer indoors and stay a safe distance away from structures outdoors.
 - Always place the fryer on a stable, hard, level surface.
- The temperature of the cooking oil can reach its flash point and self-ignite if not controlled.
 - If splashed or spilled, the hot oil will cause severe burns.
- Be extremely careful when putting the turkey in and bringing the turkey out of the fryer.
 - Never put a partially defrosted turkey in the fryer.
- The moisture from the unthawed turkey can cause splattering of the hot oil and cause burns.
- Never cook in the rain or snow due to the moisture causing splatter or even turning to steam.
 - Check the radar prior to frying the turkey and know weather expectations for the day.
- Remember to keep small children and pets away from the fryer as the temperatures can cause severe burns.

ONCE AGAIN TIME TO PREPARE FOR SNOW

Throughout the winter/spring season (until May 31), the City of Nevada has parking restrictions for snow removal.

Anytime 1 inch of snow or more falls, the snow emergency is automatically in effect. This means no vehicle can be parked on or in a City street, City alley, or a City parking lot until the snow is removed.

The snow emergency helps City crews to remove all snow from these areas. It also reduces the risk of snow and ice buildup in these areas.

Streets Department leaders put it this way: "Please help us to help you."

If vehicles are moved, the roughly four-hour snow removal process involving seven trucks, can be completed efficiently. It is also important that people don't push their snow into a cleared street.

"We usually try to be out by 3 a.m. with a goal of having streets cleared by 7 a.m.," said Joe Mousel, City Streets Superintendent.

Depending on snow timing, trucks can be out any hours working on snow removal during snow events.

Signs are posted throughout the City with the snow emergency information. The City does not send out any type of broadcast or alert that a snow emergency is in effect. "Automatically in effect" means if an inch of snow is on the ground, we are in a snow emergency.

So, it's best to plan ahead and pay attention to the forecast.

Vehicles that are parked on the city streets, alleys, or in parking lots during these events face possible fines and/or having their vehicle towed at the owner's expense.

One more note about snow and how you can keep your neighborhood safe: It is greatly appreciated for residents to clear the snow around nearby fire hydrants. Although this is not a requirement, it can save valuable time for firefighters which can have a large impact on safety as well as reduce the amount of time it takes to put the fire out.

Jalene Hornbuckle, a volunteer with HCC, said Solomon had told her that FIB has grants available, after a bank employee mentioned they were interested in volunteering there as a group. "I called the 800 number to ask a few questions about the grants, and she suggested we put in two applications since we were doing two separate projects," Hornbuckle said.

One project receiving \$500 was switching the use of the storage room from a sorting space to a collection space. Along with the money, bank volunteers helped HCC volunteers empty out and sort holiday decorations and clothing, insulate and hang drywall, and reroute a heating duct into the storage room with the help of a licensed contractor.

The second project was weatherization to control loss of heat and air during the different seasons. Under supervision of a licensed contractor, bank and HCC volunteers installed see-through vinyl door strips to help make the back entry more energy efficient.

Hornbuckle also noted that FIB has partnered with HCC on coat drives during cooler weather months. "We are thankful for this partnership." And for the recent grants and work day, she noted, "This experience was incredibly positive... We are so very grateful to First Interstate Bank."
